Town Farm Car Park

Parking is a concern in every market town and it is increasingly frustrating that motorists choose to park on residential streets rather than using the car park located in the town centre, behind the Community Library on High Market Place. The Town Farm car park in Kirkbymoorside is a long & short stay car park and with a long stay permit you can park for as long

as you like, any day of the week for as little as £4 per week, and you don't have to walk for miles to get into the town centre because you're already there!!! Permits are available from the Post Office, and you can either get a quarterly permit for £52 or an annual permit for £208. You will also then be able to park in any long stay car park in Ryedale!!! You can now get 1 hour FREE parking between 12midday and 2pm every

day. Instructions on how to obtain your free ticket are detailed on the ticket machine.

If you only need to park for a short time and the free 2 hour spaces are not available on Market Place then a short term permit, for as little as £52 for the whole year will allow you to park for up to 2 hours in any short stay car park in Ryedale on any day!

THE TOWN FARM CAR PARK IS OWNED AND REGULATED BY RYEDALE DISTRICT COUNCIL.

ON-STREET PARKING IS REGULATED BY NYCC.

THE TOWN COUNCIL HAS NO AUTHORITY ON PARKING

The Town Farm car park will be resurfaced in early November so keep an eye out for notices detailing when the works will be carried out.

Public consultation on proposed bus shelter

traffic congestion, air pollution, collisions, and carbon footprint.

In 2017, Kirkbymoorside Town Council agreed NRPTG's proposal to purchase a bus shelter to be sited at the eastbound bus stop on the A170 at a cost of £3,790.00 + VAT to include a suitable base at a cost of £730.00 + VAT.

Residents living close to the proposed site have expressed their objection to the bus shelter being installed and subsequently NYCC Highways Authority have suspended the licence pending the outcome of a public consultation.

The eastbound bus stop is served by an hourly bus service, during working hours, and not winter Sundays. East Yorkshire Motor Services



Northern Ryedale Public Transport Group (NRPTG) are volunteers working to improve public transport and public transport facilities in order to help non-drivers get out and about for work or education, enhance physical and mental well-being, get to services or to see friends & family, and also to bring visitors to the town. Improved public transport facilities give car-drivers the option to leave their car at home. This reduces environmental damage,

The proposed shelter would be small and transparent. The back of the shelter would be 3.98m from the road edge, it would be 1.3m deep and 3m long.

An Egyptian Evening with Professor Joann Fletcher

In what promises to be a very interesting talk, the well-known Egyptologist, Professor Joann Fletcher, will give a talk at the Library at 5pm on 17th November on the importance of animals to the Ancient Egyptians and how they were portrayed in the art of the era. It coincides with the launch of Bils & Rye's latest show depicting Animal Art by some of the UK's most revered artists, including Louise McNaught, an artist who has done much work with the WWF to raise awareness of the many endangered species. Professor Fletcher has made many television and radio appearances and has published several books including 'The Story of Egypt' and 'Cleopatra the Great'.

Kirkbymoorside Town Council

The full Council meets on the third Monday of each month except for August. Meetings are open to the public, start at 7.30pm and are held in Church House, High Market Place, Kirkbymoorside. A170 roundabout

You may have noticed that the roundabout has recently been improved as the plants that were reinstated after the construction works last winter did not fair well. The replacement plants have been sourced locally from Daisy's Garden Centre and thanks go to Rita Gibson for her time and expertise.

Christmas lights

This year the roundabout will be resplendent with new Christmas lights which have been very generously given to the Town by Lesley Temple. The gift of the Christmas lights is a lovely gesture that will be enjoyed by all in the town and everyone passing through Kirkbymoroside. It is also a very appropriate way of marking Lesley's 50 years of work and her contribution to our town.

As with last year there will also be Christmas lights adorning the Silver Birch trees on Piercy End and High Market Place. The trees will not be felled as they are now protected by a Tree Preservation Order. Hopefully they will be part of the streetscape for several more years.



Community Public Access Defibrillator

Earlier in the year the Yorkshire Ambulance Service NHS Trust provided notice that they were in the process of transferring ownership and sustainability of the Community Public Access Defibrillators (CPADs) back to the Communities. This presented the opportunity for the proprietors of the George & Dragon to ask the Town Council to adopt ownership of the defibrillator. The Town Council agreed and the defibrillator that was located in a locked cabinet inside the George & Dragon lounge, and therefore only accessible during opening hours, is now located on the exterior wall of The Moorside Room, 9 Church Street. Members of the Council are pleased that this vital equipment is retained in Kirkbymoorside and is now more accessible to the community in the town centre. There are two Community Public Access Defibrillators in Kirkbymoorside, one in the town centre at The Moorside Room and the other at the Sporstfield.

West End

You will no doubt be aware that there are concerns about the traffic and road safety on West End. The Town Council shares these concerns and the subject has been considered at length over the past 18 months. Earlier in the year the Town Council received a copy of the petition, initiated by a resident of West End and signed by 164 residents, which was submitted to NYCC Highways Authority to clearly demonstrate the traffic concerns on West End. One course of action available for the Town Council to pursue without the necessity of legal orders is the installation of bollards on the pavement, which would act as a deterrent for motorists to drive along the pavement. The Town Council recently engaged the residents of West End in an informal consultation to determine the support of a proposal to introduce bollards on the North side of the street. The responses from residents on West End were received and considered by the Town Council at the meeting on 17th September, 6 in favour: 30 in opposition. On the basis of the responses it was

agreed that the proposal was not feasible and therefore bollards will not be installed on West End. Upon further consideration the Town Council agreed to apply to North Yorkshire County Council Highways Authority for an experimental Traffic Regulation Order to implement a one-way system on a trial basis. It should be noted that North Yorkshire County Council are the Authority responsible for all highways issues including traffic and road safety matters and the Town Council must refer to them to address concerns about road safety in Kirkbymoorside. The NYCC Highways Improvement Manager has explained that the request for an experimental Traffic Regulation Order to implement a one-way system on a trial basis, in itself does not guarantee the implementation of the TRO. It would still need the support of the County Council and there are many aspects that need to be considered and satisfied in order to progress the matter.
