2020/21 Budget

At the October meeting the Town Council agreed the 2020/21 budget and set the precept at £74,000. This is a 0.68% increase and the first adjustment to the precept since 2013. Whilst other Local Authorities are cutting service provision and charging more, this fractional increase enables the Town Council to maintain all service provision. It also ensures that additional costs forecast for the coming year can be met. These include contributions towards a new Tennis clubhouse and the annual planting, installation and watering of the flowering baskets by teh In Bloom group.

The Town Council continues to efficiently and economically provide a range of services including: management of the town cemetery; provision and management of the play areas at Old Road and Ryedale View; management of the Moorside Room, Manor Vale Woodland and the Sportsfield; cutting of the grass verges, maintenance of the A170 roundabout and management of the riverbank near the weir: provision and maintenance of street furniture (the public benches and bins throughout the town); Christmas lights and maintenance of the town clock.

Details of the budget and other associated documents are available on the Town Council website.

Improvements to the basketball court

Climate Emergency

Ryedale District Council recently declared a Climate Emergency. All our Local Authority Officers will now be considering Carbon Footprint in their day-to-day work. All across Ryedale, the UK and the World, ordinary people are doing things to reduce their carbon footprint and protect the environment. Small things we do around here are actually part of something really big. If you are feeling worried that you can't do very much, here are some suggestions: -

i. Bees are at risk, and local beekeepers are reporting 2019 as a bad year. If you have any outdoor space for planting, bees like crocus, hyacinth, calendula and wild lilac in the spring, then bee balm, cosmos, Echinacea, snap dragons, foxglove and hosta in the summer, and in the autumn zinnias, sedum, asters, witch hazel and goldenrod are all late bloomers.

If there is any spare land near you, talk to your neighbours, perhaps you could share some planting? If you need some help, contact us at the Kirkbymoorside Environment Group. We will be having a free plant, shrub and tree swap in the spring at Towlers Arch.

ii. Trees are brilliant for carbon capture. Matt Pollard at the Kirkbymoorside Age UK shop is organising tree planting for the Woodland Trust who provide small trees for public land. Let him know if you have any ideas for where to plant them, matt pollard@live.com, Kirkbymoorside Environment Group is also starting a small tree nursery to provide trees for private land. Why not plant some acorns, conkers, or other tree seeds for us? Spare pots can be collected from outside 4 Tinley Garth.

iii. Transport produces 28% of the UK's greenhouse gases, and exhaust fumes are poisonous for all of us. Could you car-share, use public transport, share an electric bike, walk or cycle? If not, could you help raise money to support our work for local cycle tracks and public transport?

iv. Talk to your friends, family and neighbours about little changes you plan to make; we can encourage and help each other.

The grant also includes funding for a new cash register and coin sorter.
